O COMMEMORATE THE 50[™] anniversary of the founding of Josai University, this

two-day international symposium brings together leading. scholars of art, literature, and music for an interdisciplinary look at how inquiry into the role of orality and sound has the capacity to transform research in Japanese studies. Individual papers by scholars from around the globe will explore intersections between sound and image, orality and the written or printed text, and acoustic aspects of diverse premodern aesthetic environments. Subject matter ranging from the performativity of literature and paintings, to the altered meaning of Buddhist texts when vocalized, to an analysis of a singular ancient musical instrument will shed light on how and why an archeology of premodern soundscapes opens up new avenues for future scholarship. One premise of the event is that orality need not be conceptualized in opposition to the written text or the instantiated visual object, but viewed rather like fabric strands within a textile, in a non-hierarchical relationship interwoven into a meaningful aggregate.
