Josai Hosts the 45th Commemorative Symposium "Japan's Economy: Escaping Financial Crisis"

Date: February 23, 2011 Place: Josai University Educational Corporation, Kioicho Campus

On February 23, 2011, Josai's Symposium, commemorating its 45th year, was held at the Kioicho campus. Over 150 people participated in this year's symposium that chose "Japan's Economy: Escaping Financial Crisis" as its topic of discussion.

This year's symposium featured participation from four of the leading thinkers, on both the national and international level, in the field of economics—Tokyo Stock Exchange Group, Inc. CEO Atsushi Saito, Japan Credit Rating Agency, Ltd. President and CEO Makoto Utsumi, Japan Center for International Finance Advisor Tomomitsu Ōba, and Dr. Dong Soon Kim, Professor of Korea's Chung-Ang University School of Business—who considered various methods for Japan to escape its economic difficulties.

During the first half of the symposium, Mr. Saito used stock market analysis to suggest methods for restoring and reinvigorating the Japanese

economy, while Mr. Utsumi regarded Japanese recovery from an international finance perspective, and Mr. Ōba offered analysis from a public and international finance perspective, using the latest information on the Euro crisis as a frame of reference. The first half closed with Mr. Kim's talk on Korea's economic recovery and subsequent development. The second half of the symposium consisted of a panel discussion coordinated by Professor Kazutaka Kirishima from the Department of Contemporary Policy.

Josai Holds Its First Annual Japan-China Financial Management Forum: "Where is Chinese Economic Development Headed?"

Josai held its first annual Japan-China Financial Forum entitled

"Where is Chinese Economic Development Headed?" at the Tokyo



Kioicho campus on December 20. The event was cosponsored by Josai's Institute of Contemporary Policy and the Josai International Center for the Promotion of Art and Science.

The forum commenced with a lecture on "The Present and Future of Dalian's Financial and Technological Development" from Yushi Chen, Spokesman for the Dalian Bureau of Japanese Finance. Mr. Chen explained Dalian's history as a site of economic and technological growth en route to becoming a city of 550,000 people complete with not only industrial but educational, sports, and recreational facilities since the program's inception in 1980. This was followed by an address on "The State of China's Finance Industry" from Professor Guotai Chi of Dalian University of Science and Technology's department of Industry and Business Administration, as part of the academic exchange agreement between Dalian University and Josai.

The venue was packed with many based in Dalian and involved with Chinese industry expansion, as well as exchange students from Dalian University. As the venue reached capacity, some students gathered in the hall to watch a live feed of the lecture on the TV set up there. There was a lively Q&A session afterward, engaging the interest of all industry officials involved.

Josai Hosts Global Policy Initiative (GPI) Forum

On November 27, 2010, the Global Policy Initiative (GPI) Forum was held on the Kioicho campus in room 302. With the support of the Japan Foundation, the event was cosponsored by JICPAS and the Mizuta Graduate School of International Administration (MGSIA).

Taking "Strategic Mergers in Foreign and Domestic Policy" as its topic, the first session began with a conference on "the direction of policy" with Mieko Nakabayashi of the House of Representatives and other commentators speaking on a variety of topics such as finance, foreign policy, the population problem, and the national budget. Issues involving problems with the current administration, international politics, and economics were discussed from a variety of angles, and there was a lively discussion on the direction of current and future policy. MGSIA faculty member Takahiro Suzuki also participated, concluding the session by confirming the significance of the forum

while articulating the importance of positive thinking in approaching these issues.

The theme of the second session was "Determining Policy for the Greater Acceptance of Foreign Laborers: Sharing Knowledge between US and Japan," with Resident Scholar of the United States' East-West Center, Mika Shimizu, serving as coordinator. Professor Makiko Ueno of Kansei Gakuin University and many other experts presented on issues of immigration, employment, and US immigrant worker policy. More than seventy students and other spectators attended the event, contributing spirited opinions to the Q&A session. Careful consideration was given to the role of Japanese policy in the global community, with serious discussion among the participants continuing even after the forum had officially concluded, thereby seeming to confirm the significance of the event.

On November 24, 2010, Professor Reijo Miettinen of Helsinki

University delivered a guest lecture on innovation and national policy

at Josai's Kioicho campus. With graduate students from the Mizuta Graduate School of International Administration as the focal point, more than forty graduate students and other visitors attended the 90 minute long lecture from Professor Miettinen with translation and commentary provided by graduate studies lecturer Yuji Mori of Shizuoka University followed by a Q&A session.

Innovation, an important concept within the current field of business administration, one that has been developed from a variety of different angles and disciplines, business innovation has also been included as part of JIU's MGSIA and Josai's Business Administration curriculums

where it is a subject of active study and participation. Finland is known as the first nation to incorporate concepts of innovation developed in the realm of commercial progressive technology into national policy for use in education and regional revitalization.

In Professor Miettinen's lecture, he indicated the importance of an education system that includes integrated learning that incorporates national and industrial innovation as well as policy planning. In addition, he lectured on the irrationality of excluding the socially underprivileged, the second arrival of welfare society, and new methods of analysis used in social psychology, concluding the session by answering questions from the audience.

Josai Hosts 6th Annual Promotion of Asian-Pacific Women's Studies Award Ceremony

The ceremony presenting this year's Award for the Promotion of Asian-Pacific Women's Studies was held at Josai International University's Institute for Gender and Women's Studies on the Kioicho campus on February 18, 2011. Selection of this year's award, the 6th in the ten years since its foundation, proved to be a very difficult decision for the committee members who ultimately awarded two candidates.

The Chairman, Chancellor Noriko MIZUTA, gave a speech outlining the development of Josai International University's Gender and Women's Studies program, as well as the significance of the award and the expectations extended to its recipients.

This year's top award was given to Jaok Kwon a COE scholar at Tohoku University for her study, "Expansion of the Women's Sphere in Korean Agricultural Movements: Between Class and Gender in Democratic Movements, 1960-80," with Noriko Kamiyama of the Center for Social Welfare named as the runner-up for "An Inquiry into the Women's Protection Project and the Extinction of Feminism: Focusing on Women's Lib."

Fukuko Kobayashi, the spokesperson for the committee, observed that, "With the large number of impressive submissions this year, it's my great pleasure to give the award to these two exceptional scholars. Given the immense promise of their dissertation topics, it is my hope that this award will act as a motivation for them to realize the completion of their projects."

Guest speakers such as Christine Nakamura (Counselor, Canadian Embassy), Akira Maruyama (President, Saitama News Corporation), Yuichi Kashima (Managing Executive, Obayashi Corporation), Tomoyuki Susuki (Executive Director, Prince Takamado Memorial Foundation for Japan-Korea Exchange), and Kumiko Bando (Director, Lifelong Learning Policy Bureau for the Ministry of Education) also provided their congratulatory words, which seemed to deeply touch the awardees.




